 [The resolution of June 19, 1902, directed the Judiciary Committee of the Senate to cause to be prepared a consolidated index to the United States Statutes at large, Mar. 4, 1789–Mar. 3, 1903. The work was done under the supervision of the late Senator Hoar of Massachusetts, then chairman of the Judiciary Committee. From 4 to 7 persons were employed upon it for about 3 years. They did not make an original index, but consolidated the volume indexes in the volumes of the Statutes at large. The edition was limited to 25 copies, for the use of the Judiciary Committee. These were distributed as follows: 13 sets to the 13 members of the Senate Judiciary Committee; 1 set to the Committee as a body; 1 to the Senate library; 1 to the Senate document room; 1 to the secretary of the Senate; 1 to the Senate Chamber; 1 to the Senate Committee on the District of Columbia; 1 to the Senate Committee on Appropriations; 1 to the House Committee on Appropriations; 1 to the House Committee on the Judiciary; 1 to the clerk of the House; 1 to the Attorney-General; 1 to the Secretary of State—25 in all. No appropriation has been granted for printing additional copies, and none has been printed.]
