S3. ARBITRATIONS AND MIXED COMMISSIONS TO SETTLE INTERNATIONAL DISPUTES

The full literature of an arbitration held to decide an important question usually consists of the case, counter

case, and argument of each of the parties in controversy, with numerous appendixes containing testimony, important documents, etc.; also the proceedings, the award, and the report of the agent or counsel.

The publications listed below represent in many cases only a portion of the work of the arbitration or commission in question. In some cases, the reports, etc., were printed only as Congressional documents and are therefore omitted here. Usually the United States prints only its own case, arguments, etc., similar documents on the opposing side being publications of the other Government. In some instances the files of the Public Documents Library are incompeted.
